

### The Lost Art of Being Forgiving Like the Son

### When We Recover the Lost Art of **BEING** Forgiving...

- We reflect God's unconditional attitude toward sinners in general.
- > It does not always *result* in the conditional act of personally forgiving our offender.
- lt does not **replace** going and giving forgiveness.

The Unconditional Attitude of Being Forgiving	The Conditional Act of Giving Forgiveness
Personal The need for our hearts to be right before God and toward the person.	Relational The need to go to the person – preferably in person.
Unilateral The offender does not have to be involved for this to happen.	Mutual The need to interact with the person and not do it unilaterally.
Unconditional  Does not depend on what the offender does or does not do.	Conditional The offender asks for forgiveness and forgiveness is given.

## Being Forgiving Set Us Free Even When Others Never Ask Us for Forgiveness or Never Give Us Forgiveness!

Being forgiving is the **gospel-centered** way of being set free when dealing with the unrepentant.

Being forgiving is an **unconditional attitude** that sets us free when others don't confess their sin and ask for forgiveness.

Giving forgiveness is a **conditional act** that sets others free when they confess their sin and ask for forgiveness.

### Recovering the Lost Art of Being Forgiving Like Jesus

Being forgiving REPRODUCES the heart attitude of Jesus on the cross and Stephen being stoned.

"Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." - Jesus (Luke 23:34) "Lord, do not hold this sin against them!" - Stephen (Acts 7:60)

#### How Did the Rebel on the Cross Repent and Ask for Forgiveness? Luke 23:40-43

#### The Rebel Had a Change of Mind About...

- 1) Future RETRIBUTION from God.
- 2) His own **REBELLION** rightly deserving to be punished!
- 3) Christ's RIGHTEOUSNESS who did not deserve to be punished in this way
- 4) Christ's authority to **RULE** as King in His coming kingdom!
- 5) Christ's ability to **REDEEM** him from his sins!
- 6) God's **REVELATION** of Jesus as Lord, the only Savior of the world!
- 7) Christ's RESURRECTION from the dead!

#### The Rebel's Change of Life Is Seen in...

- 1) WHAT he STOPPED doing: MOCKING CHRIST!
- 2) WHAT STARTED doing: EXPOSING SIN!
- 3) WHO he TURNED to for salvation: CHRIST ALONE!
- 4) WHY he ASKED for salvation: To enjoy being under the LORDSHIP OF CHRIST!

### Lessons to Learn About the Art of Being Forgiving Toward Others (Especially Those Who May Never Ask Us for Forgiveness or Never Give Us Forgiveness)

- ➤ Being forgiving is a **RADICAL** attitude toward the unrepentant offender.
- > Being forgiving is a radical **READINESS** to forgive the offender before they ever repent and even if they never do repent.
- Being forgiving is a radical REQUEST for God the just Judge to show mercy to the unrepentant offender.
- Being forgiving is a radical <u>RELEASING</u> of the unrepentant offender into the hands of our merciful Judge.

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
